It's hard to believe that it's been 30 years since the Disney film THE LION KING was introduced, along with the hit song for the movie THE CIRCLE OF LIFE written by artist Elton John. If you remember, the thought behind the theme was that all of life is interconnected, and with each new generation comes a fresh chance for new cycles of life to begin. It was fun entertainment then, and still is now.

In BRBA though, we prefer to see moments when GOD orchestrates His own "CIRCLE OF LIFE" in and among our churches and with God's people. We are witnessing such a movement of God with SUMMIT TRACE CHURCH in Frederick, MD this month!

Summit Trace Church was started as a mission church plant in 2001 by then Pastor Bill Craig. The mission church was coordinated by Dave Burt (BRBA) and was sponsored by Pastor Larry Eubanks and the well-established family of believers at FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH of Frederick, MD. At that time, the church was still located in downtown Frederick, and had not yet moved to their new facility on Braddock mountain. Summit Trace started their services on Saturday nights at the Dill Avenue church, and planter Bill Craig would attend Sunday church with the FBC family. First Baptist sent resources and some people to help start the new work, which soon grew and advanced to meet in the Delaplaine Arts Center, the local college, a school, a movie theater, and then to a commercial space off of Buckeystown Pike.

Summit Trace has had 2 pastors since Craig left (he is now a church planter in Livermore, CA). Dan Housam served as pastor until a few years ago when he went to Myersville to restart a BRBA church there. Then Rob Downs stepped in and presently serves. The church (because of terribly overpriced commercial rental prices in the area) will move this month from their 24/7 warehouse rental space back to where it all got started 23+ years ago. They have signed a contract with the BANNER SCHOOL - which just happens to be in the same building that was the old FBC of Frederick!! Yes, since the church started services on those Saturday evenings in 2001, they will (for the immediate future) be right back in the old FBC sanctuary - worshiping and praising God on Sunday mornings!

In recent years, commercial rental space in Frederick County has skyrocketed in price. Two of our congregations (Summit Trace & Third Day) have faced huge increases in rent and had to leave the worship space they have been accustomed to for years, due to rental rates in the THOUSANDS per month.



Summit Trace Church - in searching for a new more affordable place to meet - found God's CIRCLE OF LIFE for them. Pastor Rob Downs says that it feels like the church is strangely "coming home" and moving back into it's roots, 23 years after it all began. They believe that God has orchestrated things so that the church could see the mighty provision from God in every circumstance, and every age.

Jesus once said: "If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father who is in heaven give good things to those who ask him!" (Matthew 7:9–11)

Paul reminded the church at Corinth: "And my God will meet ALL of your needs according to the riches of His glory in Christ Jesus"!

God's watch-care and provision for Summit Trace Church has been obvious over many years. They asked Him for guidance and direction, and He answered their prayers - bringing them full circle back to the their roots.


History of Memorial Day

Last Monday in May

The holiday grew out of the Civil War, as nearly 2% of Americans died in that war. Several places lay claim to being the birthplace of Memorial Day. One of the earliest accounts comes from nearby Boalsburg, Pa., (north of Harrisburg) where, in October 1864, three women are said to have placed flowers and wreaths on the graves of men who had died serving the Union during the Civil War.

Our own region is rich in Civil War history with Antietam National Battlefield, Monocacy National Battlefield, South Mountain sites and the town of Harper's Ferry being preserved for our ability to visit and reflect on that rich history. The bodies of those who died in that conflict, according to one Civil War General, "lay in almost every city, village, and church courtyard in the United States" and deserve to be held in memoriam.

For many years, the commemoration was widely referred to as "Decoration Day." But as it evolved to honor not only Civil War soldiers but all troops who had fallen serving the country in the armed forces through numerous wars and conflicts, Congress formally changed the commemoration's name in 1967 to MEMORIAL DAY. A few years later, the government decreed that Memorial Day should occur not on May 30 each year, but on the last Monday of that month.



The change was part of a broader effort to create three-day weekends, Sarah Weicksel, the director of research and publications with the American Historical Association, said, "They wanted it to be an opportunity for people to be able to gather."

Reflections on the Cross

This year was a strange Holy week for me. I was finishing up a interim pastorate for one of our churches in BRBA, yet was not preaching or singing at any worship services. That's a different role for me, as I have had a lead role in every single Easter celebration in my life spanning back over almost 50 years.

I took the opportunity to be ministered TO for a change. Instead of leading worship, I participated in worship. Mary and I attended multiple services at different churches, and rather enjoyed the experience together as most newlyweds would.

I took some time to reflect on the sacrifice made on the cross for my sins, and refreshed my feeling of unworthiness in the face of the flood of absolutely amazing grace from God, my creator. To say that I am humbled by the story of the gospel of Christ is a massive understatement, because words can't express the magnitude of my sadness that He had to die such a cruel death for me.

1 Peter 2:24-25 says: He himself bore our sins" in his body on the cross, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; "by his wounds you have been healed." For "you were like sheep going astray," but now you have returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls. (NIV)



Allow me a few moments this month to share what others have said about their experience in looking to the cross of Christ in their own personal lives:

There is no doctrine more excellent in itself or more necessary to be preached and studied, than the doctrine of Christ, and him crucified. John Flavel

The gentle, compassionate Jesus is also the Jesus who drove the merchant-thieves from the Temple and spoke condemnation against self-righteous religious leaders. Though many recent writers have spoken of God's vulnerability and weakness demonstrated on the cross, we must see this truth in the context of God's sovereignty. Christ chose this "weakness." Key Bridge Disaster Relief Update

As everyone now knows in our region, The KEY BRIDGE in Baltimore collapsed early Tuesday morning, March 26th, effectively shutting down all ship traffic in and out of Baltimore harbor, and halting all traffic around the east side of Baltimore on I-95 / I-695.

Transportation police acted quickly (within a 90 second warning window) to stop all vehicle traffic on the bridge and save lives, but unfortunately a overnight construction crew could not be evacuated in time, and plummeted into the icy waters of the Patapsco River below. Please pray for the 2 survivors, and the families of all whose lives were lost in this enormous tragedy.

As is the case with many disasters and tragedies, SBC DISASTER RELIEF is ready to



respond to assist those in need and be a witness for the Gospel while attending to people's physical, emotional and spiritual needs. WE NEED MORE TRAINED DR VOLUNTEERS to answer the call to help when things like this come up!!

Currently - volunteers and equipment are on alert / stand by status - to potentially feed workers involved with bridge debris removal in the weeks and months ahead. The bridge situation is constantly changing, so we may receive short notice to start feeding, or a few days' notice, and we want our teams to be ready when and if the call to serve comes in.

Other volunteers may also be needed (not just trained feeding unit workers) such as mechanics, Chaplains, general workers, administrative, inventory, etc. Ellen Udovich at the Baptist Convention od MD/DE is our coordinator and will be in touch with every DOM in the associations when teams are being assembled.

Pray for the BALTIMORE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION as well as the FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF DUNDALK as they begin to coordinate "Caring Skills for Crisis Situations". The goal is to equip laypeople from churches around the harbor area in daily spiritual and emotional care that will help them minister to their neighbors during this time of community-wide grief and anxiety.

Please also remember to pray for the Dali crew and pilots. Pray in the months ahead for the many employers and employees who are anxious about their income and paychecks. There is much concern about what the immediate future holds for these workers and their families.


